GROWING IN INTEGRITY / Tony Tay

WARM UP | It has been said that "environments do not make who we are, but reveal who we are." This is very true indeed when we carefully observe how people behave when they are under pressure.

During a camp retreat, a co-worker who was not acting like his normal self became very grumpy when the meal was served late. He said, "I just can't help being grumpy when I am hungry." People do reveal their true character when under stress.

About one quarter of the books in the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, and about half of John's gospel were about the last week of our Lord Jesus' life on earth. The incredible pressure mounting on Jesus during his last week on earth was more than just physical, but spiritual. However our Lord displayed such an amazing, perfect character of integrity and love to the people till the end. In His dying breath on the cross, He still stretched out His love and care to people around Him. Jesus suffered for us to leave us an example that we should follow in His steps. We will receive a rich welcome into His eternal kingdom when we grow in faith. (2 Peter 1:11)



READ | 2 Peter 1:3-11; Matthew 5:3-10

BACKGROUND | Faith is a journey and growing involves step-by-step addition. It is a progression of spiritual attributes (2 Pet 1:5-7) and spiritual blessedness (Matt 5:3-10). Meditate on the correlation between the following eight steps of growing in faith:

Faith

- Poor in spirit (not by work)
 - Justification

Goodness

- Mourning (first fruit of faith)
 - Repentance

Knowledge

- Meekness
 - Power

Self-control

- Hunger and thirst for righteousness
 - Faithfulness

Perseverance

- Mercy
 - ⇒ Jov

Godliness

- Pureness in heart
 - Holiness

Brotherly kindness

- Peacemaker
 - Peace

Love

- Persecuted because of righteousness
 - Agape love

CONSIDER THIS

- ⇒ No man can purchase his integrity too dearly, for it is the only thing whose value must ever increase with the price it has cost us.
- Our integrity is never worth so much as when we have parted with our all to keep it.
- If you lose your money, you have lost nothing; if you lose your health, you have lost something; if you lose your integrity, you have lost everything.
- Better is the poor who walks in his integrity than one perverse in his ways, though he be rich. (Proverbs 28:6)
- lt is not what we eat but what we digest that makes us strong; not what we gain but what we save that makes us rich: not what we read -but what we remember that_ makes us learned; and not what we profess but what we practise that gives us integrity.
