Growing Through Singleness November 20

To be single is not unusual, unfortunate, unnatural, or undesirable. Neither is singleness a deadly disease cured only by marriage.

In fact in the next few paragraphs of this article I want to convey to you how it's possible to be single, sanctified, satisfied, stable and definitely not surplus!!

So, how do we find ourselves viewing this singleness situation? Listed below are the main reasons for living as a single...

- **Suddenly single** through death, divorce, separation or abandonment
 - Single by choice our busy career, comfortable with our own lifestyle
 - Single by circumstances a consequence of belief, or compatibility issues

A good starting place on this subject is some scripture from the book of Genesis. In Genesis 1:26-27 God's Word declares He created us as individuals, both "male and female".

We can take from this that singleness is the most natural state for men and women, and that state is primarily and initially for us to have intimate fellowship with our Creator God.

Then in Genesis 2:18 The Lord God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him".

Notice God did not say, "It is not good for the man to be single (so I will marry him off)".

What He did say is, "It is not good for the man to be alone".

The key thought here is loneliness and the importance of companionship. God knows we need fellowship, company, friendship, associates and relationships with others so that we may draw strength and encouragement from each other.

Bearing all the above in mind it's important for us to differentiate between being **alone** and being **single.**

Single people can form friendships outside of a marriage relationship, and therefore not be alone. It's also possible to find the companions we need without having to go along the marriage route.

Here's the question to now ask ourselves "Is it possible that I may know fulfilment,
stability, love, completeness, support and





> encouragement and remain single?" The answer has to be "yes".

The Bible as God's Word states in Colossians

2:8-10 "Don't let anyone lead you astray with empty philosophy and high-sounding nonsense that come from human thinking and from the evil powers of this world, and not from Christ. For in Christ the fullness of God lives in a human body, and you are complete through your union with Christ..."

Through an active faith in Christ, completeness and contentment in

singleness can be found and this of course applies to the widower, or divorcee as well.

Even if you were to become married, you would still need to recognise that while a marriage partner may complement you, they can never bring completeness, as only a relationship with Christ as Saviour makes this possible.

I conclude this article with the Single's ABC:

A) Avoid the "when I get married" syndrome

Make your own plans as a single – job, lifestyle, travel, accommodation, new car. Don't adopt a "holding pattern". Singleness may not be a permanent calling for you, but it needs to be accepted as a present reality. This frees us to be the people God made us to be.

B) Beware of society dictating to you on the negatives of marriage – such as, Marriage is not working; There is a big divorce rate; Become a 'swinging single', do a little flirting, loosen up; You're too picky, too choosy; Shop around!

C) Confidently live in your present situation as a single person

Take full advantage of the positives all the time and freedom to seek God's best in planning your life's pathway. Keep in mind that partnership with someone later will always be enriched if we give God total ownership of ourselves now.
